Eighty-fifth Annual Report, 1955-56

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE

The Committee has pleasure in presenting the Annual Report for the year ending 31st March, 1956. The average number of children at the School during the past year remained at fifty-one, three pupils left and a six-year-old boy from Antwerp was admitted.

The aims of the School, which are to teach as high a standard of education as possible and to prepare the children for entry into the general community, continue to receive the enthusiastic co-operation of the fully qualified staff. Parents of deaf children are encouraged to send them to school at an early age, so that lip-reading and speech can begin as early as possible.

The Committee accepted with regret the resignation of Mr. R. H. Jessel, the Hon. Treasurer, who had given ten years' valuable service to the School, and of Mrs. P. Wachman, Mr. J. J. Newman and Mr. S. G. Schwab. A welcome is extended to Mrs. A. J. Cowan and Mr. P. Lebor, the latter being the energetic present Chairman of the R.S.J.D.C. Society.

The President, Sir Frederick Stern, received a knighthood in the New Year Honours' list for his services to Horticulture. He has been a member of the Executive Committee since 1912 and succeeded his cousin, the late Sir Edward Stern, in the office of President in 1933.

The House Committee, under the chairmanship of Miss Schlesinger, holds its monthly meetings at the School, to consider all matters concerning the management of the house and staff, supervises the household accounts, receives the Matron's Report and examines in detail all estimates before sending them to the Executive Committee.

The After-Care Committee, in addition to placing the school-leavers in work, discusses the progress made by the pupils who left the School during the last few years in their various occupations. Brenda Feltz, who left at the end of the Autumn term, is taking a course of Business Training at Pitman's College.

Again this year a depot was organised at the School for Alexandra Day. In addition, some friends of the School sold roses at the Mansion House Depot in the City, where charities who nominate their own sellers receive corresponding benefit.

The R.S.J.D.C. Society held their Annual Garden Fête at the School in July, which was a great success financially. It was also a reunion of past and present pupils of the School with their friends and relatives. In December, instead of the usual Dance, it was decided to organise a Celebrity Concert at the Princes Theatre. Many well-known artistes gave a very enjoyable entertainment, which was compered by Mr. John Slater, who gave his services on that occasion. At this concert, Alderman Fisher of Stoke Newington made a moving appeal, when the audience was asked to complete the donation and subscription slips which had been inserted in the programmes. This resulted in some much needed new subscribers to the funds of the School. Among their gifts to the School during the year the R.S.J.D.C. Society gave a donation of £500 to the 90th Anniversary Appeal and defrayed the cost of the installation of new gas-cookers and a hot-plate cupboard. In January the Society held its Annual General Meeting at the School, which was attended by a large number of parents and their friends.

The Committee is most grateful to Mr. J. A. Denny, the Hon. Surveyor, who has again given invaluable help in advising the Committee and supervising the repairs and decorations carried out at the School.

In September the School implemented the arrangements made with the London County Council in offering boarding accommodation to those of their pupils who live too far to travel daily to the Oak Lodge Senior Girls School for the Deaf, situated next door to the School. Application has been received for similar facilities to be offered to boys from the Versailles Road, Anerley, School when it closes down at the

end of 1956, and the classes are transferred to the Oak Lodge School.

The 90th Anniversary of the founding of the School was celebrated at the Seymour Hall, Seymour Place, on 1st December. A special sub-committee was elected, under the chairmanship of Miss Schlesinger, to plan the programme and arrangements. The first part of the programme took the form of a Fantasia of Nursery Rhymes, written by the teaching staff, in which all the children took part. The parents of the children helped with the making of the attractive costumes under the supervision of the Matron, the scenery and effects being made by the children in their Handwork classes. Some of the old pupils then gave a short sketch. This was followed by the Distribution of Prizes by Viscountess Bearsted, and then appeals for funds were made by Viscount Bearsted and the President, Sir Frederick Stern. The proceedings terminated with a reunion of past and present pupils and friends of the School. There was an exhibition of the children's handwork and hobbies, including the work of some of the past pupils, amongst which was an excellent display of amateur photography.

The Guests of Honour included the Viscount and Viscountess Bearsted and their Worships the Mayor and Mayoress of Marylebone, as well as many prominent people in the Jewish Community.

At this function copies of the Souvenir Brochure Programme were sold by the stewards, the advertisements for which were obtained chiefly through the energetic work of Mrs. H. A. Leon and Mrs. H. Morrison. Special thanks are due to Mr. Maurice Caplin, of Messrs. R. S. Caplin, Ltd., who gave his services in arranging for its production.

The Committee has received the following Legacies from the Estates of the late Miss G. Behrens, £50; S. M. Gubbay, £100; and Isidore Abrahams, £5 5s.

The Bank overdraft has been reduced from £14,000 to about £8,000. At present the School has a loss of about £2,000 a year. This cannot go on for ever. If the Jewish Community wish to continue this school for Jewish Deaf children, subscriptions and donations must be found by them to cover this difference between the income and expenditure. This School

has a reputation as one of the best schools for the deaf in the country, even receiving pupils from abroad. If it is to be continued at the highest efficiency the money must be found.

The Committee is proud to have Mr. L. J. Benham as Headmaster, who is rightly highly esteemed among the teachers of the deaf. It also wishes to record appreciation of the efficient work of the teaching staff.

Miss Ballinson is indefatigable in coping with all the domestic worries of these times, and in spite of these she and her house staff continue to look after the children at the highest level. The Committee is indeed grateful to her and her staff.

The Committee wishes also to record how much the Secretary, Miss Mosely, has done in the last year, during which she carried out much extra work for the Ninetieth Anniversary Appeal.

HEADMASTER'S REPORT

On the 31st March there were forty-nine children in the School, twenty-five boys and twenty-four girls, including twenty non-Jewish children. In addition to the above, there were three girls resident at the School but who received education at the Oak Lodge School for Senior Deaf Girls. Ages range from four to sixteen, and they are accommodated in six classes. They are drawn from the following Local Education Authorities: London, Middlesex, Coventry, Devon, Essex, Hampshire, Kent, Liverpool, Manchester, Surrey and Sussex. There are also three children from overseas.

Two girls and one boy left during the year. One of the girls was taken to the United States to see an ear specialist in the hope that an operation might restore or improve the hearing. Unfortunately nothing could be done. The second girl left in December, and is now attending a commercial

college for training as a typist. The boy was transferred to a Partially Deaf Unit. A six-year-old boy from Belgium was admitted during the year.

David West, aged twelve, sat for the entrance examination to the new Technical School for Deaf Boys, which was opened in September, 1955. Although successfully passing the written test, he was not accepted in face of the very strong competition for the four places available.

In spite of changes in staff, steady progress has been maintained in all educational pursuits. For this year senior boys and senior girls have been in separate classes. Subjects in the curriculum of the top classes include: English Language, Hebrew and Religious Knowledge, Speech, History, Geography, Citizenship, General Knowledge on Current Affairs, Art, Arithmetic, and various forms of Handwork. Senior children continue to attend evening classes in Tailoring, Electricity, Occupational Handicrafts, Cookery, Typing, and Embroidery. Hobbies are encouraged.

During the holidays many of the children are given special tasks involving individual research. Parents are invited to assist in this work, and by so doing they not only help in the education of their child, but also acquire a closer understanding of the problems created by the handicap.

Auditory training is given throughout the School through individual and group hearing aids. It is hoped to acquire two new pieces of equipment which will assist children to improve the quality of their speech. The R.S.J.D.C. Society has agreed to defray the cost of constructing a Speech Pitch Indicator by which voice modulation can be made visible. The other piece of apparatus is an Individual Auditory Training Unit which is specifically designed to help the profoundly deaf child.

The Arts and Crafts Centre continues to provide the necessary facilities for a wide variety of craftwork. During the past year the heating has been supplemented by the installation of slow-combustion stoves and a Black and Decker Electric Drill and Lathe Outfit provided by the S.W.A.N. Committee.

As a denominational school, Religious Instruction remains an important part of the curriculum, and in addition to learning elementary Hebrew the children observe the Festivals and

Holy Days, and attend a service on Friday afternoons. During the year three boys were Barmitzvah at a very impressive service held at the School and conducted by the School Chaplain, the Rev. Philip Cohen. The non-Jewish children attend a Children's Service at St. Luke's Church on Sunday mornings. The Service is interpreted for them. Eve Cochrane was confirmed by the Bishop of Kingston. Four boys and five girls have been accepted in local troops of Scouts and Guides respectively. They attended Camp during the Summer holiday, the Scouts in the Lake District and the Guides at Leeds Castle in Kent. Their expenses were paid by the R.S.J.D.C. Society. Mixing with hearing boys and girls in these activities has proved an unqualified success. A Pack of Wolf-Cubs was started last September and is being run by members of the Younger Set Aid Society. Meetings are held once a week and are very popular.

The children, staff and I are greatly indebted to all our friends who, as individuals or members of Societies, have contributed so much towards the happiness and welfare of the children through the provision of gifts and treats.

Once again the senior pupils enjoyed acting as hosts at a Social given to parents and friends which followed the Chanukah Party.

Although there have been epidemics of Measles and Mumps since 31st March, during the actual year under review in this report the health of the children was particularly good. The School attendance record was the highest for some years, being over 95 per cent. In addition to the weekly and special visits made by the School Medical Officer, Dr. S. G. Askey, M.D., regular inspections have been made by Mr. I. Spiro, F.R.C.S., the Hon. Oculist; Mr. A. T. Ratcliffe, F.R.C.S., the Hon. Otologist; and by Mr. E. Marthews, L.D.S., the School Dentist.

Johnnie Ray, the popular American singing artiste, was one of the many visitors from home and overseas who spent time at the School. Visitors also included groups of members from various branches of the League of Jewish Women, Synagogue Ladies' Guilds, and Jewish Societies. As part of their training, groups of students from a number of Teachers' Training Colleges also visited the School.

During the year we were sorry to lose the services of Miss Borrow and Miss Emanuel. Miss Balkanyi, appointed in September, has spent many years teaching and doing special research work with deaf children. We are also pleased to welcome on the teaching staff Miss Adams, who was formerly Head of a Nursery Unit of deaf children.

The Matron, Miss R. Ballinson, joins in thanking the School Committee for its understanding and helpful advice, and the Secretary, teaching staff, Matron's assistants, and domestic staff, without whose co-operation and ever-willing service the efficient running and happy atmosphere of the School could not be attempted or achieved.

MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT

From the medical standpoint the past School Year has been a good one.

In spite of the severe and prolonged cold weather we had no serious illness. Healthy children as a rule are not much affected by vagaries of the elements. We have had no major epidemics.

The children have always appeared full of life and very happy, and it is this delightful atmosphere about the School which makes the duties of the medical officer a great pleasure and a visit to this youthful community one of the highlights of a busy practice.

It is good to have the honour of working with Miss R. Ballinson, whose care of the children could not be bettered, and who is brilliant in detecting illness in its early stages.
