## RESIDENTIAL SCHOOL FOR JEWISH DEAF CHILDREN



### Eighty-second Annual Report, 1952-53

The Committee has pleasure in presenting the Annual Report for the year ending 31st March, 1953. At that date there were fifty children in the School, an increase of five since the corresponding period of the previous year.

The work of the school continues to be carried on efficiently under a fully qualified staff. In addition to learning to speak and to lipread, the aim of the school is to reach as high a standard in education as possible, to fit the children to take their place in the hearing world, and at the same time to enable them to obtain a knowledge of the tenets and practices of their religion.

In order to keep the school equipment up to date, three of the classrooms have been refurnished with new desks of the most modern design, the cost of two has been met by donations from the R.S.J.D.C. Society and the Finchley Combined Aid Society.

Parents of deaf children are encouraged to send them to school from the age of three, so that lipreading and speech training can begin as early as possible.

The fortnightly talks to parents by the Headmaster have been continued during the year. Parents are advised on the best ways of helping their children at home in lipreading, and in the acquisition of oral and written language.

Instruction in Hebrew and Religion is given regularly, and the children attend special services weekly and during the Festivals and Holy Days. Non-Jewish children receive special religious instruction from teachers of their own denomination.

In July, Miss Renee Wolfson, who had gained her diploma after finishing her training at the Department of Education of the Deaf, Manchester University, joined the staff.

In April a meeting of the Association of Independent Residential Schools for the Deaf was held at the school, when delegates from all over the country attended. The school was represented by Miss Schlesinger and Mr. Benham.

The Committee congratulates Mr. Benham on being elected Vice-Chairman of the Metropolitan and Southern Branch of the National College of Teachers of the Deaf.

### OPEN DAY

The school reverted to its pre-war custom of holding an Open Day in July, so that the display by the children and prize distribution could take place in the garden. There was a good attendance of members of the Committees, relatives of the children and friends of the school. The proceedings opened with sports and games by the children, after which the awards were distributed by Mrs. F. C. Stern.

The new Arts and Crafts Centre was formally opened by Mr. Greenfield, the President of the R.S.J.D.C. Society. This building provides facilities for woodwork, bookcraft, weaving, modelling and simple electricity and chemistry experiments and is very popular with the pupils.

There was a display of the children's handiwork and hobbies.

## HOUSE COMMITTEE

This Committee under the able Chairmanship of Miss Schlesinger, has been strengthened by the co-option of Mrs. Sodel, and Mrs. H. Morrison. A weekly sewing party at the school has been organised by the West London Group of the League of Jewish Women.

The House Committee continues to deal with all matters concerning the management of the house and staff, supervises the household accounts, receives the Matron's reports and examines in detail all estimates before sending them to the Executive Committee. A special donation from Jewish Child's Day for household equipment was spent on Vantona coverlets for the children's beds.

## AFTER CARE COMMITTEE

Six pupils left the school after reaching their sixteenth birthday. Sonia Davis is learning dress machining, Ruth Rapaport and Benno Icgson are working in a ladies' handbag factory owned by the parents of one of the pupils. Harold Fallman and Lothar Bieber are learning cabinet making and Joshua Hassan, bespoke tailoring. The last named, whose home is in Gibraltar, is living at the Club and Hostel of the Jewish Deaf Association at Cazanove Road.

In addition to arranging for their employment, this Committee sees that the children join local youth clubs and the Jewish Deaf Association's Club where their first year's subscription is paid for by the R.S.J.D.C. Society.

## MEDICAL

The health of the children has been generally satisfactory during the year under review. In addition to weekly and special visits by the School Medical Officer, Dr. S. G. Askey, Dr. Claude Elman, M.D., the School Consultant, has given advice when requested;

regular inspections have been held by Mr. I. Spiro, F.R.C.S., the Hon. Oculist, and Mr. A. Radcliffe, F.R.C.S., the Hon. Otologist and by Mr. E. Marthews, L.D.S. (Eng.), the School Dentist.

During the spring term there was a serious epidemic of influenza lasting several weeks, during which time nursing and special care of the children was carried out by the Matron, Miss Ballinson, and her assistants.

At the Chanukah Party the children acted an abridged version of "Les Miserables," for which performance they had painted and made the scenery themselves. In the summer the annual Inter-Sports Competitions between the schools for the Deaf at West Ham, Tottenham and this school, was held at the school.

## R.S.J.D.C. SOCIETY

In order to raise funds this Society held their annual fête at the school in July, and the winter dance

in November, at the Coventry Street Corner House. These functions were very successful both financially and socially. In addition to outings and treats for the children, the Society had provided chairs for the dormitories, furniture for the isolation rooms and classrooms and other amenities.

#### REPAIRS AND DECORATIONS

The Committee thanks Mr. J. A. Denny, the Hon. Surveyor, for the immense amount of time and trouble which he and his staff give to the work of supervising, also advising on the care of the school building.

#### FINANCE

The Committee is most grateful for the following donations: The Isaac Davis Trust, £75; the J. E. Joseph Charitable Trust, £100; The United Charities Fund of the Liberal Jewish Synagogue, £45, and the Aid Society, £25.

In order to meet the increasing cost of maintaining the school, subscriptions and donations are urgently needed, and the Committee would be most grateful if friends of the school would sign Deeds of Covenant, thereby increasing the value of their subscriptions. The necessary forms can be obtained on application to the Secretary.
