A Moving Day at Beth Shalom

In October, the JDA became the first deaf group to visit the Beth Shalom Holocaust Memorial in Nottingham. Our Chairman, Mrs Evelyn Gee, was amongst the group, which was accompanied by a sign language interpreter, and all

of whom found the experience both fascinating and moving. And none more so than one of our members, Ann Senchal, who was a Kindertransport survivor, and who lost both

parents and her elder brother to the Nazis.

During the visit, a rose in the memorial garden was dedicated 'to the victims of the Holocaust'.

A loop induction system has now been installed at Beth Shalom to enable all those with hearing difficulties to better understand the lectures

given at the Centre. The JDA's Executive Director, Pat Goldring says: 'It is important for our members to have

full access to their cultural heritage and to centres such as Beth Shalom, which is an outstanding source of research and information about the Holocaust.'
