Sponsored by the Jewish Deaf Association to commemorate its Diamond Jubilee (1951-2011)

As part of the JDA's special Diamond Jubilee commemorations, a group of JDA members organised an outstanding event to remember lost loved ones and be reunited with old friends.

Colleen Daniels saw her special dream realised on Sunday 1 May 2011 with a Holocaust Memorial Service and Reunion of past pupils of the former Residential School for Jewish Deaf Children (RSJDC).

Together with her husband Alan and a group of close friends, and supported by the JDA, Colleen (right) and her committee brought together



more than 130 former pupils for the reunion, which took place at Hendon Reform Synagogue in North West London.

Colleen Daniels' dream

"For many years, since the last RSJDC Reunion in 1992, Colleen Daniels has been dreaming of organising the next Reunion - and of being given the opportunity to create the first Holocaust Memorial Service for the Jewish Deaf Community in this country. The reason for her dream of this unique Memorial Service is that every year we read in the media about the Jewish community and their children holding their own Holocaust Memorial Services and lighting candles for those who perished during the Holocaust.

Colleen wanted to give Jewish Deaf survivors the opportunity to share with others their experiences of survival during World War II, and to give them the honour of lighting the memorial candles.

Colleen's committee formed

So, in April 2010, with the help of her husband Alan, Colleen finally discussed her dream with Sue Cipin and Ann Clements of the JDA, in the hope that this special event would take place during the JDA's 60th Anniversary year. It was agreed that the JDA would support Colleen and sponsor the event. Colleen formed a small group of close friends, who gave their free time for monthly meetings at each other's homes for twelve months.

The committee volunteers agreed to set the date of Sunday 1 May 2011, to coincide with Holocaust Remembrance Day in this country.

Colleen, with some committee members, attended regular meetings with JDA staff, Sue, Ann and Suzie, to organise the arrangements. It was not an easy task to arrange this enormous event.

Survivors' stories

With help from Alan, Irene and Ann, Colleen spent hours collating Deaf survivors' stories, as well as corresponding with the other survivors via email. They received many stories, some of which were presented at the Memorial Service on PowerPoint, created by Irene.

Gudula Cahn and her grandson Ben Forman

Gudula Cahn was one of 11 children smuggled out from Germany to safety in England during World War II. She was the only hearing child in a group of Jewish Deaf children aged 2-11 years. Her parents were both teachers at the Israelite Institute for The Deaf in Berlin.

One day, Colleen was doing some research on the internet and she discovered that Gudula Cahn had a grandson, named Ben Forman, living in Uxbridge. Colleen's daughter, Marlene, endeavoured to trace him and successfully contacted him via email. One week before the event, Ben Forman met with Colleen, Alan and Marlene. It was an emotional meeting.

Ben was enthusiastic to come to the event and speak about his grandmother. It was agreed to make Ben's appearance a surprise to the survivors who had travelled to England with Gudula Cahn.

Committee volunteers signing poems

We chose two poems for the Memorial Service, written by children held captive during World War II.

At the meetings at our homes, we practised signing these poems, with the help of sign language interpreter **Peter Abraham**. On 1 May, we had a final rehearsal on the stage and the actual performance of signing the poems went very smoothly later on. The poems are shown at the end of this feature.

We were overwhelmed with the number of people attending the event. We aimed for at least 100 people, and were surprised that the numbers reached 140.

Some of them came from abroad, Canada, New York and Germany. Many people had not seen each other for a long time. For example, **Ann Miller** with her partner (from Canada) had not seen her old school friends for over 50 years and it was indeed a memorable reunion for them all. We also were thrilled to meet two ex teachers from RSJDC, **Liz Wieneke** and **Norma LeBihan** (nee Sansom) again.

Survivors share their emotional experiences

During the first part of the Holocaust Memorial, the survivors shared their childhood experiences of the Holocaust and explained how they escaped the clutches of the Nazis.

Unfortunately, some Deaf survivors were

unable to attend, so their stories were told by committee members. It was very emotional 'listening' to their stories.

We displayed the speakers' childhood photos and their stories on the PowerPoint screen. Thanks to Gillian Stringer (RSJDC ex pupil), another screen was set up showing live filming of the speakers. This enabled those sitting at the back of the hall to follow the dialogue more easily.

There were two interpreters - Peter Abraham and Gloria Ogborn - who voiced-over everything that was being signed for the hearing guests, as well as a lipspeaker, Rosalind Josephs. Hands-on interpreters made sure the Deafblind guests could participate fully throughout.
